Celestin lived with his mother and four brothers in a refugee camp in Rwanda for 17 years. When he was in eleventh grade, his family moved to the United States through the Refugee Resettlement program.

During the first few years of their life in the United States, all six members of the family shared a small, three-bedroom apartment. But once his two older brothers moved out on their own, Celestin wanted to ensure that he, his mother, and two younger brothers were able to plan for the future.

After living without one for so long, Celestin knows that a home is the foundation for a stable life. "You would never plan for anything if you don't have a place to live – so you have to have a place to call home first to think about something else."

Quality housing – housing that is safe, healthy, and affordable – is foundational to individuals and families, to the communities, in which we live and to the economies in which we all participate.

Yet the need for decent, affordable housing has never been greater. Over **1 in 4** Matthews households are either living in poverty, near poverty, or considered "house poor"¹.

Housing is the key to reducing intergenerational poverty and increasing economic mobility. Research shows that increasing access to affordable housing is the most cost-effective strategy for reducing childhood poverty and increasing economic mobility in the United States.



Driven by the vision that everyone needs a decent place to live, Greater Matthews Habitat has partnered with families for over 30 years to build and improve places they can call home.



Greater Matthews Habitat for Humanity is the only affordable home builder and no-cost critical home repair provider in the communities of Matthews, Mint Hill, and Stallings.

Seeking to put God's love into action, Greater Matthews Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities, and hope.

Our Vision

A world where everyone has a decent place to live.

Since 1989, with the help of many hardworking and committed community partners, volunteers, and partner families, we have built over 100 homes in 9 neighborhoods in the Greater Matthews community.

The problem is far-reaching and complex.













More than 37 million households in the U.S. – 31.5% of all households in the country – are paying more than 30% of their income on housing¹. 18 million households are paying half or more of their income.



There is no state or county where a renter working full-time at minimum wage can afford a two-bedroom apartment².



Increasing access to affordable housing bolsters economic growth. Research shows that the shortage of affordable housing costs the U.S. economy about \$2 trillion a year in lower wages and productivity².



A worker in Mecklenburg County must make \$18.60/hour³ to afford a two-bedroom apartment at fair market rent. In Matthews, that number jumps to \$21.73/hour⁴.



Matthews is short 600 affordable housing units to fill the current need and is one of the fastest growing areas in Mecklenburg County⁵.



1 in 4 households in Matthews is either living in poverty, near poverty or considered "house poor"⁵.



68% of the existing affordable homes in Matthews are between 30 and 60 years old and likely need serious repair⁵.

Our work focuses on building generational wealth by increasing access to homeownership and housing finance, improving the condition of exisiting affordable housing units, and building strong and resilient neighborhoods.

Our work includes:



New construction serving first-time homebuyers with limited income who would not qualify for traditional home financing models. Our houses are designed to aesthetically match current neighborhoods and utilize green building philosophy.



Improvement and repair of existing affordable homes to keep homeowners safe and healthy in their existing homes. Our Critical Home Repair program allows eligible homeowners the option to age in place at their current affordable residence. We are able to mitigate the financial burden of costly but necessary home repairs for those on a limited income while making necessary accessibility modifications.



Advocacy, which advances access to adequate and affordable housing through changes to policies and systems.



We work alongside families who partner with us. Each family invests their time and effort building their own homes and pays an affordable mortgage.

We are aided by our volunteer-led model. Local community members donate their time and their talents to build, advocate, and raise awareness of the need for housing.



Through shelter, we empower.

Affordable housing is the foundation on which families and communities thrive.



Health

Respiratory diseases, lead poisoning, cancers from toxic materials, and neurological disorders are all linked to substandard housing conditions. Affordable housing also allows for extra income for insurance, routine health screenings, & more nutritious food.
