Meet our Current Homebuyer: Ryan

Future Greater Matthews Habitat homeowner Ryan loves sharing his passion for cooking with his two children, 10-year-old Connor and 8-year-old Izzy. Their favorite? Spaghetti and meatballs. **"That is a weekly staple,**" he says, laughing. **"And they get upset with me when we skip it."** Even though Ryan works as a line cook for a country club, as a single father, he understands the importance of the three of them cooking together and sharing meals as a family.

Currently, Ryan is renting a two-bedroom townhome in Matthews. While he can afford the rent, the unit is not sized appropriately for his family, with the children sharing one bedroom "The one good thing about it is that it's affordable – my rent right now is \$850, so I'm very lucky. That being said, it's a two bedroom, so my kids share a bedroom. And with them getting older, being a boy and a girl, they're going to want their own spaces eventually."

However, there are other problems. "It's old, it's got some structural issues that I've tried to have addressed and just haven't been. It's got original windows, linoleums coming up all over the place, the counters are kind of settling and getting a little wonky. It's affordable, but it's not the nicest of places, or the safest", Ryan explains. His particular safety concerns involve their bathtub - located on the second floor. "They didn't do the greatest job of sealing the bath tub and as the kids were younger, they were taking baths and splashing water out it was getting under the floors and that's the part that's kind of unsafe. It's also starting to rust out around some of the drains and stuff....

our bathroom floor is actually a little, squishy."

With the tub being located on the second floor, Ryan worries that, at some point, it will fall through the ceiling. "I've had it looked at three different times," he explains. "Each time a guy will come take a picture and say 'ooh, carpentry needs to be involved in this one' and then I just never hear back....I really think they're just planning on dealing with it when I move out, but with the affordability of the place I've kind of just hung on."

But by partnering with Greater Matthews Habitat to build and buy his own home, Ryan looks forward to the family having their own safe space. He plans to improve their meals together by growing his own fruit and vegetables. "I'm really excited about hopefully being able to do a garden. Every year I do tomatoes in pots and they never do that well, but I keep trying every single year. So I'd really like to be able to grow my own produce and have a nice little section that I can make my own garden. And then also, doing landscaping...just watching the progress of growing all the stuff and taking care of it and having a beautiful garden out front and out back. I look forward to being able to do that with my own space." "I'm really excited about hopefully being able to do a garden. Every year I do tomatoes in pots and they never do that well, but I keep trying every single year. So I'd really like to be able to grow my own produce and have a nice little section that I can make my own garden. "

Future Habitat homeowners are active participants in the homebuilding and home buying process To be eligible for our program, all applicants must meet four criteria:



Need for Housing

We partner with families who experience crowding, expensive rent, or unsafe conditions in their current housing.



Demonstrated Income


Applicants must demonstrate the ability to repay an affordable mortgage, about 30% of their monthly income, and fall within our income guidelines.



Willingness to Partner Homebuyers participate in the construction of their home by completing 150 volunteer "HIP-hours".



Residency Applicants must have lived or worked in our service area at least 12 months prior to applying.



At the heart of our initiatives lie strategic approaches aimed at combating various facets of the affordable housing crisis.

Through targeted efforts, we aspire to achieve long-term outcomes centered around financial stability, community engagement, and improved health for all. While we realize that addressing the affordable housing crisis will require a multi-faceted approach with many stakeholders, these initiatives set our overarching goals and objectives as an organization and identify the role we can play to serve our community.

Homeownership

We focus on building affordable homes and empowering families through property equity and financial stability. This leads to:

The restoration of the historic Rowland-Clay home (*story next page*) exemplifies our Home Preservation Initiative. From structural repairs to accessibility modifications, it demonstrates our dedication to preserving community heritage and supporting residents like James.

Preserving Our History: The Rowland-Clay Home

When asked why James likes living in Matthews, he points to his bedroom in the home that's been in his family since around 1929 and says, "The fact that I was born here in Matthews, in that room, almost 73 years ago, makes it home for me. Every place that I've been, you have your ups and downs, but, emotionally, when I get back here, I'm alright. Whatever happens, I'm alright."

James' emotional tie to his home underscores its significance as more than just a building – it's a symbol of family and belonging. The Rowland-Clay house holds deep roots within the community and serves as a poignant reminder of our area's rich cultural heritage. Designated a historic property in 2005, its preservation is vital to maintaining our collective history.

Reflecting on the state of his home, James recalls, "It was really bad... The floors were messed up, water running up under the house contributed to the structural integrity giving away. You would be sitting down there on the toilet, and you're looking up, at the stars, you don't know whether to flush cause you're going to go backwards too. A big branch kind of impaled the roof, and there was a hole in the roof coming all the way to the kitchen. Every time it rains, there's water all over the place."

Luckily, this past winter, we partnered with James to address these concerns as part of our Home Preservation and Aging in Place initiatives. Through our Critical Home Repair Program, generously funded by the Town of Matthews, the Community Development Block Grant, Mecklenburg County, and individual Habitat supporters, we embarked on a comprehensive restoration effort. From repairing the roof and rafters to installing piers for structural support, our goal was to ensure the home's safety, accessibility, and preservation. Accessibility enhancements, such as an accessible shower, were also incorporated to improve the quality of life for James and future occupants. Reflecting on his hopes for the future of the home, James shares, "Oh, I'd like for it to remain a valued part of the Crestdale community. I'm gonna do all that I can to keep up with the upkeep of the house and hopefully as I have moved on to a different place, hopefully I've been wise enough to choose someone who understands and appreciates what we have."

Restoring the Rowland-Clay home is not just about preserving a piece of history; it's about honoring the legacy of those who came before us and creating a safe and dignified space for future generations. As we near the completion of this project, we are reminded of the profound impact our work has on individuals like James and the enduring spirit of our community. James expressed his gratitude for the support, saying, "Once again, thank you to the Town of Matthews, to Habitat, the Preservation Society. This has been a lifesaver."

The Historical Significance of the Rowland-Clay Home

The Charlotte-Mecklenburg Landmark Commission judged the Rowland-Clay home as having historical significance based on three characteristics. The home is:



one of only four houses that remain to demonstrate the architecture of Tank Town, a rural community settled by freed slaves in the 1860's



only one of the four Tank Town homes that is built in the Craftsman style, which demonstrates the strivings of rural African American workers in the first half century after emancipation



an important remnant of a rural community, and way of life, that no longer exists in Mecklenburg County
